PROFESSIONAL PROFILE

Expert in international relations with a view to the Diplomatic Career or to a career in international organisations, public institutions and sectors – central and local – and in private enterprises working abroad.

PROGRAMME

The Master teaches the skills that are needed – at a juridical, economic, historical and linguistic level – to work in an international context.

APPLICANTS

Graduates (old system or new system specialist degree) from Italian or EU member state universities. Graduates from universities outside Europe can also enrol as long as in possession of a degree recognised as being equivalent.

STRUCTURE

- Minimum number of students: 30
- Total number of hours in course: 1,500, of which 513 in the lecture hall divided into lectures; seminars and practical exercises for the history, juridical and economics areas; written exercises in English and French language; lectures in history, economy and law.

LECTURERS

University lecturers in law, economics, history, languages and computing.

SYLLABUS

“Economic policy and economic, commercial and multi-lateral financial cooperation”

Constituent subjects:

- Analysis of the theoretical elements of economic policy, according to the most recent results of scientific research on the subject (rational expectations and the theory of games in particular)
- Analysis of applied issues, with emphasis on the subjects of cooperation, among which: present globalisation tendencies; worldwide economic cooperation (with reference to the G8 meetings and the action by the world Bank and specialised agencies working for the UN) and regional cooperation (with specific reference to the European Union area, and also

areas such as the Community of Independent States, the Organisation for African Unity, and the large regional organisations of America, Asia and the Pacific area);

- commercial cooperation (with special reference to WTO negotiations);
- financial cooperation (with specific reference to the work of the International Monetary Fund and the analysis of subjects linked to the circulation of capital, exchange agreements and currency areas).
- A special part of the course will be dedicated to giving sufficient understanding of the questions of the effectiveness of enterprises in the international field, with particular attention to the regulations and features of the economic-productive environments in community and world market contexts.
