



Regulation to determine the average mark with which students will face the discussion of the thesis and the final degree exam mark

Art. 1. These regulations came into force from the Academic year 2005-2006 and regulate the activities of the student's administration office for the correct management of the scholar's careers to be presented in the dissertation sessions and the criteria for determining the final grade of the graduation mark.

Art. 2. The student's administration office determines the average mark with which the student faces the dissertation session through mathematical methods distinct for every student.

Old system for university degree

The average mark derives from the sum of the marks of the exams done divided by the number of exams taken.

The resulting value is multiplied by 11 and divided by 3 to obtain the average mark expressed in "one hundred and ten" (110). If the average mark contains decimal points, only the first 2 digits after the comma are considered in the count.

New system for university studies

The average mark is obtained by multiplying each individual exam mark by the number of credits attributed to the exam (weight). The sum of the products obtained must be divided by the sum of all the credits obtained in the exams taken. The weighted average mark is therefore expressed by the following formula:

$$(V1 \times C1 + V2 \times C2 + V3 \times C3 + \dots)$$

= Weighted average mark

$$(C1 + C2 + C3 + \dots)$$



V1, V2, V3, ... represent the marks of the exams and C1, C2, C3, ... are the credits of the corresponding exams. The resulting value is multiplied by 11 and divided by 3 to obtain the weighted average mark expressed in “one hundred and ten” (110). If the average mark contains decimal points, only the first 2 digits after the comma are considered in the count.

Art. 3. In general, all the activities that have been supported during the undergraduate or post-graduate degree, attended and passed with a mark expressed in thirtieths (30), determine the weighted average mark except for the activities attended and supported as educational debt, excluding the case studies below.

For the student who has made an incoming transfer or an on-going transfer to an undergraduate course, the average mark is determined on the basis of the marks obtained in the activities supported in the degree course and in those recognized as valid according to the course regulation. Therefore, for the purposes of the student's career, marks, SSD, TAF and CFU are associated with these activities.

For the student who has made an incoming transfer or an on-going transfer to a Master's degree course, the average mark is determined on the basis of the marks obtained in the activities completed in the Master's degree course and in those recognized as valid according to the regulations of the Master's degree. Therefore, for the purposes of the student's career marks, SSD, TAF and CFU are associated with these activities.

For students who have enrolled as a second qualification in an undergraduate course, the average mark is determined only on the basis of the marks obtained in the activities supported in the Module course.

The activities recognized as valid according to the degree program regulations are integrated into the student's career with the date of the decision of the Module Board and with the indication of SSD, TAF and CFU, excluding marks.



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For the student who has enrolled as a second qualification in a post-graduate course, the average mark is determined only on the basis of the marks obtained in the activities done in the postgraduate course. The activities recognized as valid according to the regulations of the Master's Degree Course, are integrated into the student's career with the date of the decision of the Module Board and with the indication of SSD, TAF and CFU, excluding marks.

Art. 4. In order to determine the final grade, the Graduation board adds to the average mark presented by the student in the graduation session, an additional score expressed in “one hundred and ten” (110) as established by the Department regulations.

The minimum score for a valid degree exam is 66/110; the maximum score is 110/110 with honours.

The final grade of the Module expressed by the Board is unquestionable.
